## Major recovery efforts underway

### Rebuilding Safe Housing

- Residents received
   \$573M+ in FEMA Individual
   Assistance
- 6,900 households received temporary housing
- 5,300+ applications received for Renew NC single-family housing program
- 525 homes repaired or replaced by volunteer organizations with \$16M in state funds

### Restoring our Infrastructure


- 7m+ cubic yards of rightof-way debris removed
- 7m+ cubic yards of waterway debris removed
- All site assessments

   (more than 6,500 in total)
   completed in State's
   Private Roads & Bridges
   Program
- \$33.1M in FEMA funds disbursed for private roads and bridges

## Revitalizing our Economy and Communities

- \$55M in state and philanthropic funded small business grants fully disbursed, with more than 2,100 recipients
- \$414M+ in SBA loans offered
- \$39M+ in disaster unemployment assistance distributed
- \$148M+ in loans to local government units

# Selected State Program Updates



## Nearly \$14M in NC Small Business Infrastructure Grants Awarded

Part of **\$55M appropriation** from the NC General Assembly to assist small businesses by expediting infrastructure repairs impacting the operation and patronage of small businesses in the affected area.

Nearly \$32 million remaining; max award per project: \$1 million.

**Eligibility:** Local governments impacted by Hurricane Helene and designated under a major disaster declaration from Helene. Special consideration given to local governments in Tier 1 and Tier 2 Counties.

Timeline: Applications accepted on a rolling basis; awards announced:

- June 30, 2025 *\$7.3m* <u>announced</u> for the Village of Chimney Rock, Town of Clyde, Town of Gamewell, and City of Morganton
- November 12, 2025 19 awards for \$13.8m
- February 28, 2026 (anticipated)
- June 30, 2026 (anticipated)

## **Expanded Eligibility - Local Government Capital Grants Program**

OSBM is now accepting applications. The deadline to apply is November 21, 2025.

Award amounts are based on statutory caps per recipient and county. For this reason, grant applications are evaluated and grants awarded after the deadline closes, not on a rolling basis.

- Purpose: To provide local governments and federally recognized tribes in WNC capital grants to repair, renovate or replace infrastructure damaged by Helene.
- Eligibility: Local government units or federal recognized tribes
- Projects that are not eligible for FEMA Public Assistance reimbursement are eligible to apply for a grant; projects are no longer required to be denied by FEMA Public Assistance to be eligible.
- Not-eligible recipients: Non-Profits and Private Organizations



### **Recreation Grants Announced**

\$26.5 million in matching grants announced by the Department of Natural and Cultural Resources

The Land and Water Conservation Fund, a program under the federal Department of the Interior, recently awarded more than \$26.5 million in matching grants to support outdoor recreation projects across North Carolina. Two western North Carolina projects were awarded:

The Town of Lawndale in Cleveland County and Cleveland County Water were awarded \$500,000 for improvements to the narrows segment of the Stagecoach Greenway.

**Buncombe County** secured \$4.5 million for land acquisition to preserve the highly visible and ecologically significant ridgeline of Deaverview Mountain. The mountain boasts peaks of more than 3,000 feet and offers sweeping views of Asheville and the surrounding Blue Ridge Mountains.



## **Broadband Recovery Program for Hurricane Helene**

NC Dept. of Information Technology announces \$50M for broadband recovery work

**Purpose:** Rebuild, repair or replace broadband infrastructure damaged by Hurricane Helene.

**Eligibility**: Internet service providers with infrastructure projects in the 39 Hurricane Helene disaster-designated counties, including the Eastern Band of Cherokee Indians.

Interested broadband providers may submit applications and estimated costs through the Broadband Infrastructure Office Data Exchange.

Deadline: November 24, 2025 by 11:59 PM

## **Disaster Relief and Mitigation Fund (DRMF)**

NC Emergency Management is now accepting applications for grants funded through DRMF.

- A state-funded grant program established in 2021 and reauthorized by the General Assembly for Helene earlier this year.
- Eligible applicants are units of local government and nonprofit organizations.
- Funding can be used for flood mitigation, transportation infrastructure resilience against natural disasters, and engineering assistance grants to local governments to identify and design shovel ready projects.

Deadline: November 28, 2025 (no later than 5 PM).



# Now Open: Grants for Volunteer Organizations Active in Housing Repairs & Rebuilds, Phase 2

Phase 2 of a \$28M appropriation for nonprofit volunteer organizations aiding rebuild and reconstruction efforts in WNC. More than \$9M was <u>awarded</u> to 14 nonprofits in October.

Eligibility: Volunteer organizations actively involved in actual and ongoing repair and reconstruction projects for homeowners affected by Helene.

\*Organizations do <u>not</u> need to be a member of NCVOAD.

Deadline: December 11, 2025 (no later than 5 PM)

# Dam Safety Grant Program – Accepting Applications

Funding for dam owners to repair, modify, or remove an eligible dam to meet applicable North Carolina dam safety standards.

# Grant Funding to Support Recycling and Waste Reduction in WNC

Supports WNC communities in rebuilding and strengthening waste reduction and recycling systems following Hurricane Helene. The program provides up to \$25M in grants over multiple phases.

Eligibility: Local governments may apply for up to \$5M per project, with no local match. Eligible projects may include but are not limited to:

- Construction or improvement of recycling or composting facilities;
- Development of regional collection (hub-and-spoke) systems;
- Upgrades to convenience centers or household hazardous waste programs;
- Purchase of recycling trucks, containers, or carts;
- Related feasibility studies or education and outreach

Deadline: January 30, 2026

# Applications Open – Private Road and Bridge Reimbursement Program

The NC-PRB program opened the application process for reimbursements for private road and bridge repairs already completed.

Part of \$25M appropriation from the NC General Assembly. Reimbursements are permitted to cover up to 50 percent of a project's total cost.

## Selected Federal Program Updates

## Water Infrastructure Projects Awarded

More than \$86 million in grant funding for 14 drinking water and wastewater projects.

Five western North Carolina counties will receive more than \$86 million for 14 drinking water and wastewater infrastructure projects as part of a U.S. Environmental Protection Agency program for disaster-affected states. Notable projects include:

### **Buncombe County**

Woodfin Sanitary District

#### **Burke County**

City of Morganton, Town of Drexel, Town of Valdese

### **Caldwell County**

Town of Gamewell

### **Haywood County**

Town of Waynesville, Junaluska Sanitary District

### **Madison County**

Town of Hot Springs



The SRF Helene funding will continue to be available through year-round applications until 2026. All funded projects must ensure that the systems will be more resilient to future flooding events.

## **Crisis Counseling Assistance Extension Granted**

#### \$9 million award from FEMA Crisis Counseling Assistance through two programs

- Immediate Support and Regular Support
- Program is funded through FEMA and administered by SAMHSA



#### Funds the Hope4NC Crisis Counseling Program

- Peer to peer support, counseling programs, 24/7 hotline, referrals to licensed mental and behavioral health professionals
- 50,209 in-person contacts between 9/28/2024 and 9/27/2025
- Continued need for crisis counseling during long-term recovery



The state requested a no-cost extension to allow the program to continue beyond October 2025




This request was granted last week, allowing the program to continue into January 2026, or until funding is exhausted



## Status of Blue Ridge Parkway Repairs and Closures

The BRP remains closed for Helene repair work from MM 316.5 (Linville Falls) to MM 355.3 (Mt. Mitchell) with the exception of a 6-mile stretch (fully or partially open) near Little Switzerland







## **EDA Disaster Supplemental Grant Program -\$1.45B in Economic Recovery Funds**

Funds open to all 2023 & 2024 federally-declared disaster zones

First come, first served – EDA encourages applicants to work with their local Economic Development representatives to submit competitive projects ASAP

80% EDA funded / 20% cost share from applicant

Eligible Entities include units of government, economic development districts, institutions of higher education, and nonprofits working with local government

GROW NC seeking to increase the # of proposals from NC

- Working directly with communities to develop projects and encourage timely applications
- Additional \$6M in State Helene aid for local government capacity to assist with EDA and other applications

### Three Funding Pathways

- READINESS PATH Capacity building and strategic planning projects that set the stage for future investment
  - Max award: \$500,000
  - No application deadline
- IMPLEMENTATION PATH Standalone construction and non-construction projects that help communities recover from natural disasters and advance recovery and growth
  - Max award: \$20m
  - No application deadline
- INDUSTRY TRANSFORMATION PATH Coalition-led, multi-project portfolios that transform regional economies through targeted industry development
  - Max award: \$50m
  - Application deadline: March 3, 2026

## Additional federal updates

- FEMA Disaster Relief Fund (DRF) programs:
  - Local governments seeing reimbursement delays.
  - 90+ FEMA PA projects totaling \$155M recently approved by the Secretary of Homeland Security.
  - Projects must still go through the Defend the Spend process with the Department of Government Efficiency before money goes to local governments.
- USDA announced the reopening of county offices nationwide, allowing the continuance of certain services, including disaster aid.

# Governor Stein Announces Nearly \$22M in Contributions for Food Assistance in NC

The State of North Carolina and partners stepped up to <u>donate</u> nearly \$22M to fight hunger in North Carolina given the impacts on SNAP from the federal government shutdown. This includes a \$10M grant from the State to local food banks across NC. The following food banks serve WNC:

- MANNA Food Bank works alongside 220 nonprofit pantries, meal sites, and other community-based organizations to help neighbors access free food in 16 WNC counties. Use MANNA's <u>Food Finder Tool</u>, a searchable map, to help locate food access organizations and distributions in your community.
- Second Harvest Food Bank of Northwest NC has a "Find Food Now" tool where users can enter their zip code to find help across their 18-county footprint.
- Second Harvest Food Bank of Metrolina serves 24 counties, including 14 in North Carolina. Second Harvest has a <u>list of local</u> food pantries and soup kitchens by county.



- Overlapping efforts
- Small jurisdictions slipped through the cracks
- Changing contacts
- And MANY players—local, state, federal—to coordinate

## **Pain Points**

- Grant surge and staffing
- Finance backlogs
- FEMA Public Assistance churn
- Debris reimbursement timing
- Engineering and permitting delays
- HMGP landslide and slope stability risk

- Cash flow strain from reimbursement-based funding
- Match and cost-share challenges
- Procurement and compliance complexities
- Awareness and coordination gaps






